Workshop Descriptions

EASING THE TEASING AND HELPING KIDS COPE WITH CYBER BULLYING AND ONLINE HARASSMENT

Presented by Judy S. Freedman

As damaging as “traditional” teasing and bullying are, kids today are using electronic technology to intimidate, humiliate, ridicule, and degrade other kids. Today’s always-connected generation can harass - 24/7. This workshop raises awareness and empowers participants with tools, tips, and practical advice to help students combat online teasing, bullying, and harassment. It will address the various types of high-tech social cruelties, signs and symptoms to look for, reactions and effects of e-bullying, motivations and causes, prevention advice, and intervention strategies.

Judy S. Freedman is a school social worker and author of *Easing the Teasing - Helping Your Child Cope with Name-Calling, Ridicule, and Verbal Bullying* (Mc-Graw-Hill, 2002). As a social worker in elementary schools for over 20 years, she has repeatedly witnessed that teasing is a universal and widespread stressor for most children and teens, and it can have damaging and lasting effects. She created Easing the Teasing, a groundbreaking program to pro-actively address the issue of teasing, which empowers children with essential life-long coping skills to manage and overcome these painful incidents. Recently, Judy discovered the necessity to expand the direction and scope of her work due to the new social arena for kids to bully and harass - electronic technology. Her most recent endeavor is presenting workshops to raise the awareness about the magnitude and risks of electronic communication and online socializing. Judy lectures and conducts workshops for parents, educators, mental health professionals, and kids throughout the country, while she continues to practice social work at Prairie Elementary School, District 96 in Buffalo Grove, Ill.

PLAN TO DO BETTER: HELPING TEACHERS HELP THEIR STUDENTS CHANGE THEIR BEHAVIOR

Presented by Ambrose Panico

This course is designed to position administrators to empower their staff to develop behavior plans that incorporate belief-based, skill-based, needs-based, environment-based and reinforcement principle-based interventions. Participants will learn the “Plan to Do Better” (PDTB) process for modifying or changing undesirable student behavior. Administrators will learn to assist teachers in working effectively with the most difficult students in their classroom, alleviating the need to send them to your office. This course aligns with Illinois Professional Administrator Standards: 2 and 5.

Ambrose Panico administers programs for Behavior Disordered, Emotionally Disturbed, adjudicated, at-risk and alternative education students for the ECHO Joint Agreement in northern Illinois. He supervises and evaluates administrative personnel, as well as coordinates curriculum, instructional methodology, and therapeutic interventions. He is a practitioner who knows what it means to run a school on a daily basis.

Mr. Panico asks teachers to focus less on individual student behaviors and more on student beliefs, beliefs from which non-productive or productive behaviors flow. He challenges teachers to change their own behaviors and to create learning environments where all students have ample opportunities to meet their need to Belong, to be Competent, to experience Independence, and to have Fun. He offers strategies and materials that allow teachers to move away from curriculums of control and towards curriculums of engagement.

ADDRESSING ADVENTURESOME BEHAVIOR IN THE CLASSROOM WHILE PROMOTING DIGNITY FOR ALL

Presented by Dr. Patrick Schwartz

Considering the specific learning and support needs of diverse learners, participants of this workshop will learn about an innovative classroom management approach for addressing adventuresome learner behavior. Areas covered will be relationships, skills, communication, investigation, and variables to consider for assessment and support. Real life examples and applications will assist in making these approaches and tools relevant and useful for all. Be prepared for a different outlook and a process that works!

Dr. Patrick Schwartz is an Associate Professor of Special Education and the Chair of the Diversity I Learning & Development for National-Louis University, Chicago. In addition, he is a part-time Director of United Cerebral Palsy (UCP) Infinitec of Greater Chicago. Patrick is also author of the just released book, *From Disability to Possibility*, published by Heinemann Books. Dr. Schwarz presents and consults worldwide and is currently writing five additional books on differentiated instruction, collaboration, peaceful schools, autism, and student passions with author Dr. Paula Kluth.

ADMINISTRATIVE RESPONSES TO BULLYING IN THE SCHOOLS

Presented by Ian MacLeod

This presentation will focus on school bullying and administrative responses. A review of the existing research on bullying within the larger context of school violence as well as the importance of accepting the “ecological” model of bullying will be detailed. Following this background information, a review of bullying policies across the United States and the legislative requirements of Illinois policies will be shared. Suggestions for sound bully policies will be provided as will the importance of appropriate responses to victims and bystanders by school support staff. This presentation will be particularly beneficial to special education administrators as they often supervise programs that include students with behavioral and/or emotional difficulties who may more frequently find themselves in the role of bully and/or victim.

Ian MacLeod has presented on topics related to school bullying at the local, state, and national levels. His main interest in this area relates to the development and implementation of school bullying policies along with responsive services provided to bullies, victims and bystanders. Ian is a Nationally Certified School Psychologist (NCSP) and recently completed his Ph.D. with a research focus on bullying policies in Illinois secondary schools and related aspects of social-emotional learning. He currently works as the Division Chair for Special Education at Amos Alonzo Stagg High School.

DEVELOPING A SCHOOL-BASED BULLYING PLAN: TRANSLATING RESEARCH TO EFFECTIVE PRACTICE

Presented by Dr. Dorothy Espelage

This presentation will focus on translating research into effective school-based bullying prevention intervention. Dr. Dorothy Espelage, a distinguished expert in the field, will give an enlightening presentation that will leave participants with a better of understanding of the pervasive problems associated with bullying and victimization in school-aged youth, as well as variables such as school climate, homophily, administrative sensitivity and teacher bullying. The session will provide a context for reducing bullying in schools and classrooms.

Dorothy Espelage, Ph.D. is a Professor of Counseling Psychology at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. Dr. Espelage is a leading researcher in the studies of bullying and hazing. Her scholarship at UIUC has included investigations of several health related behaviors, including bullying and youth aggression during early adolescence. Dr. Espelage’s nine-year track record on the study of bullying is widely recognized (more than 30 professional publications and a co-edited book entitled *Bullying in American Schools*). Dr. Espelage has appeared three times on the nationally syndicated Oprah Winfrey show as a spokesperson for bullying prevention, and has presented over 100 training and professional development sessions on the prevention of bullying and other forms of violence.

HOW’S THE WEATHER OUT THERE?

Presented by Susie Bishop & Butch Lockley

Butch Lockley, final four survivor from the popular “Survivor” television show and Susie Bishop, survivor of thirty-two years of teaching, team up to forecast the climate of the workplace. If you want a safe school...it all starts with the school climate, and it starts with you! This entertaining program will provide leadership and step-by-step directions to help the climate of the school be positive, peaceful, and productive.

Susan Bishop – An educational consultant, a child advocate and a retired teacher of 32 years. Susan was the first recipient of the East Richland Foundation for Academic Excellence “Teacher of the Year” award for East Richland Middle School and a winner in the Illinois “Those Who Excel” award program.

Susie is a children’s author and currently has three books in print. She loves teaching and values it as the number one profession in America.

Butch Lockley has 30 years of experience as a teacher, coach, and administrator. His dedication and sense of humor can interest and entertain all ages.

Butch was one of 16 who competed on the CBS reality show “Survivor – The Amazon” He shares how the “Believe in Yourself” philosophy helped him achieve his dream of being on the show Survivor and finish in the “Final Four.”

PROTECTING KIDS ONLINE AT SCHOOLS AND AT LIBRARIES

Presented by Katherine Dawkins

This workshop is designed to give educators an awareness of how to keep students safe while working online, looking out for dangers and protecting personal information. Topics include: Privacy on the Internet, Internet Dangers, Child Solicitation, Government Policy and Legislation, and Conducting an Effective Online Search.

Katherine Dawkins is a teacher in Chicago and a consultant for Digital Educators. She has a B.S. degree in Elementary Education, an M.S.Ed. degree in Instructional Technology Research and Assessment, and is the first public school teacher to graduate from The John Marshall Law School’s Information Technology Law Program with a Master of Science degree in IT Law.

Katherine has published a book, “Protecting Kids Online At Schools and Libraries” that is currently being reviewed by the Office of the Illinois Attorney General Policy Division. This non-fiction resource book gives the reader a knowledge base about online protection that is valuable in today’s technological age as more young people use computer and wireless devices.

CULTURAL COMPETENCIES AND DIVERSITY TRAINING

Presented by Donna Pittman, MA

Cultural Competencies and Diversity Training expand beyond merely teaching school and district employees about differences. The program focuses on the unique diversity of each individual and demonstrates how schools and districts can build its most valuable resource – a productive learning environment for all students.

PARENT COMMUNITY PREVENTION

Presented by Donna Pittman, MA

The purpose of this workshop is to provide participants with essential parenting prevention tools and skills needed to implement a parent prevention program in Illinois school districts.

Outline of Parent Skills Training Sessions

- Introduction and group building: This session presents group building exercises and a short lecture on basic learning theories in prevention. Goals include discussing health trends in prevention, focusing on positive lifestyle behaviors, and encouraging parents to observe their child’s health development.
- Developmental expectancies and stress management: This session discusses physical, mental, social, and emotional development with a focus on appropriate and realistic expectations for children at different ages. A section on stress and anger management teaches parents what to do when they feel overwhelmed.
- Rewards: This session covers rewarding children for good behavior, "attends" (describing and emphasizing positive behavior), and providing social rewards and norm setting.
- Goals and objectives: This session focuses on setting general prevention goals, defining good behavior, setting social and emotional behavioral goals and objectives, and making positive statements to children.
- Alcohol, drugs, and families: This session introduces the parent's role in prevention of children's problem behaviors and awareness of at-risk behaviors.

Donna Pittman is a seasoned professional with over twenty two years experience in the fields of education, program management, training and development. With hundreds of platform hours and a determination to offer something different, she took that energy and desire to help others succeed and formed the Pittman Development Group, Inc. She has taught for corporations, nonprofits, foundations, government agencies, associations, and schools throughout the Mid-West and East Coast. Donna's company specializes in corporate training, prevention effectiveness and one on one coaching. The company's main focus is leadership and prevention effectiveness.

***GRANT WRITING: MAXIMIZING OSDFS FUNDING SOURCES
FOR ILLINOIS SCHOOLS***

Presented by Ron Mirr

The Program Development and Grant Writing Workshop is intended for anyone interested in obtaining grant funds from public or private sources at the federal, state, and local levels. The workshop is designed to give participants an introduction to the practical skills they will need to begin the development of competitive grant proposals. Workshop information includes: (1) a description of the general grant process with a special focus on how grants are reviewed; (2) information about the location of funding sources and the use of electronic media to find them; (3) instruction on how to review an application to determine if it is appropriate for your agency; (4) training on the use of a logic model planning process for the creation of effective grant proposals; (5) information on the budgeting process and how to maximize grant funding for your project; (6) instruction on how to create an appropriate evaluation plan for your project; and (7) training on the most effective methods for producing your grant proposal. Participants will leave the workshop with a better understanding of how to begin the grant writing process, where to look for resources, and how to prepare a competitive grant proposal.

Ron Mirr, M.S.W., is a master's level social worker that has assisted school districts and health/human service agencies obtain over \$100 million in grant funds since 1989. He is currently a private consultant in Iowa City, Iowa. Mr. Mirr has received public and private sector funding from federal, state, and local sources. He has worked as a mental health clinician, a school administrator, and a consultant to educational, health and human service agencies in 20 states and has presented at conferences both nationally and internationally.

KEEPING SCHOOLS SAFE IN A DAY OF HOMELAND SECURITY

Presented by Paul Timm

This approach takes into account five components of Safe Schools: *Management* (policies & procedures), *Building Security*, *Violence Prevention & Intervention*, *Staff Training*, and *Emergency Preparedness*. Learn how to implement practical strategies and access important resources for your Safe School program.

Paul Timm, PSP – A board-certified Physical Security Professional, President of RETA Security, Inc. and a recognized expert in school security. In addition to conducting numerous vulnerability assessments and his frequent speaking engagements, Paul serves on the Illinois Terrorism Task Force (ITTF) School Security Committee. Paul has been trained by the National Organization for Victims Assistance (NOVA) and is an experienced School Crisis Assistance Team (SCAT) volunteer. He is certified in Vulnerability Assessment Methodology (VAM) through Sandia National Laboratories and the ALPHA vulnerability assessment methodology. He is also a member of the American Society for Industrial Security (ASES) and the Illinois Association of School Business Officials (IASBO). Paul holds a degree in Speech Communications and a Certificate in Business Administration from the University of Illinois.

***EVIDENCED BASED SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING PRACTICES
THAT CREATE ACADEMIC AND BEHAVIORAL SUCCESS***

Presented by Dr. Sara Salmon

This two-day training will provide evidenced based strategies and simple systems that create behavioral and academic change in violent and aggressive youth. These strategies, which can be used in treatment centers, juvenile facilities, correctional facilities as well as the regular classroom, will build cultures of integrity, empathy, and tolerance. The training focuses on practices that incorporate Social Emotional Learning,

Aggression Replacement Training, The Peace Curriculum, Parent/Family Empowerment, a rigorous discipline system, Restorative Justice and procedures that change both teacher and student behavior. Participants will learn these strategies through demonstration and practice. **Please bring a flash drive when you attend Dr. Salmon's workshop so that you may copy more of her materials to take back to the classroom.**

Sara Salmon, Ph.D., Indiana State University (formerly Assistant Superintendent in St. Louis County) is the Executive Director of the Center for Safe Schools and Communities, Inc. with locations in St. Charles, MO and Erie, CO. Dr. Salmon has been a classroom teacher, counselor, director and clinical psychologist. She has worked closely with the late Dr. Arnold P. Goldstein in adapting the Aggression Replacement Training Program to school districts and other organizations who help aggressive students. Dr. Salmon started the Center for Safe Schools and Communities, Inc., which is a non-profit organization, committed to working in both the prevention and treatment of violent and aggressive youth.

SAFETY FOR ALL: SAFE SCHOOL ISSUES RELATED TO GAY, LESBIAN, BISEXUAL, AND TRANSGENDER (GLBT) STUDENTS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Presented by Shannon Sullivan and Albert J. Holmes

This session will address research and practice to highlight effective prevention strategies as they relate to sexual orientation and gender identity topics and issues in schools. The presenters will give information and conduct activities related to terminology, statistics, scenarios, laws/policies and resources as they relate to sexual orientation and gender identity in schools. Participants will receive an overview of effective prevention strategies and approaches that will better assist school districts with the development of inclusive programs and policies.

Shannon Sullivan, MPH is the Executive Director of the Illinois Safe Schools Alliance. The Alliance is dedicated to promoting the safety, support and healthy development for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning (LGBTQ) youth, in Illinois schools and communities, through advocacy, education, youth organizing and research. Shannon received her Masters of Public Health Sciences with a focus on adolescent health. Her undergraduate work culminated in a B.A. in English and Education with a focus on teaching high school English. Shannon has been involved in education, youth violence prevention and LGBT activism for 10 years.

TOBACCO AND ALCOHOL AND OTHER RISK FACTORS

Presented by Dr. Tommy Williams

This seminar's purpose is to inform teachers and other educational leaders of evidenced based practices that will help parents and the community, plan and implement researched-based programs, that will reduce risk factors associated with alcohol and illegal drug use. These programs can be implemented at all grade levels and are currently classified as acceptable by the National Institute on Drug Abuse. This training will also address all forms of drug use, including tobacco and other illegal drugs, as well as address the types of drug problems prevalent in local communities.

Dr. Tommy Williams, a NAADAC-certified provider, received his B.S. and M.A. from Jackson State University in Alcohol and Drug Counseling. His Ph.D. is in Alcohol, Tobacco, and other Drugs. He currently serves as the director of the Alcohol and Drug Education Program for the Gary Community School Corporation in Gary, Indiana.

Dr. Williams has an extensive background in mental health services and court-related alcohol and drug programs. He previously served as the director of a methadone clinic in Gary, Indiana. He has vast experience working with at-risk youth programs; for example, he designed many school and social drug prevention programs to help youths, which are still currently being utilized within their systems. Dr. Williams conducts various seminars and workshops across the United States. In addition, he attends numerous conferences and workshops in order to keep abreast of current trends in the field.
